At the end of 2015 I had retired from Catholic Education after close on fifty years – over thirty in Darwin, and prior to that, nine years in Melbourne after beginning teaching in my home town of Griffith NSW. In 2016, I was just coming to the end of a year at Siloam at Heart of Life, Box Hill, in anticipation of a return to Darwin and was thinking about the possibilities for Spiritual Direction in the North. I was at Mass at Holy Cross, Templestowe when my cousin said, 'That looks like you' as she showed me an advert for volunteers at ELSPM. I thought, 'yes that does look like me'. So after two or three weeks of discernment about such an unexpected change of direction and a consideration of the logistics involved, I decided to speak to Fr Kevin, and, as in all the big decisions in my life, everything just seemed to fall into place. Fr Kevin pointed me towards what was to become ELSPM house in Donvale and after meeting Sr Margaret I decided Darwin could wait!

After a holiday up north in Queensland, I returned to Melbourne and moved into Donvale and a couple of weeks later so did Sr Margaret.

One of the great gifts for me has been rediscovering the joy of teaching. From the very beginning I felt right at home and the experience over the last five years seems to have taken me back to my early teaching career. I think in the latter years the accountability side of leadership had dulled the bloom of actual teaching, perhaps it was because of having to often juggle too many balls in the air at once! These days I feel I have regained the enthusiasm of that very young teacher. I love the unexpected, the funny things students may say, do or write. I doubt I'll ever forget a student's written description of the feathers on the guinea pigs, the ex-student who seemed to make it his daily mission to make me laugh when I was teaching a very serious IELTS class in the Franciscan Collection room in St Paschal's Library, the student who emerged from his IELTS speaking test a nervous wreck because he'd made up a story that his father was a businessman, or the student who could not stop crying (in relief and joy) after getting her IELTS results! Her tears and the reactions of others have brought home to me the realisation of just what IELTS results can mean for the future direction of our students' lives

To be part of the journey of our students is such a sense of mission. It is a privilege to be witness to their faith, enthusiasm, happiness, commitment, determination, progress, innocence and developing confidence. I particularly enjoy the heartfelt nature of the weekly gospel sharing and pulling together the unique contributions to the Student Bulletin. During Covid I have really missed onsite teaching, the gatherings for the weekly Eucharist, the music, the camaraderie of the Common Room and the overloaded microwaves! I feel constantly motivated by the challenges of teaching, seeking the best way for the students and learning to teach online certainly has had its moments! It is so rewarding to be working with all the team – there is such dedication and a wonderful spirit present amongst the staff and volunteers. There is always someone ready and willing to assist and share ideas.

So despite the long Covid lockdowns, the sometimes very long Melbourne winters, the occasional longing for my home in the tropics I suspect that Darwin may just continue to wait unless the Holy Spirit leads elsewhere – who knows!


How are you today and your life as well? I wish that you all are doing well and safe.

I am happy to see my family and loved ones again after over two years far away from them. But also, sadness because I will be far away from you, lovely and nice people in my life.


Once again, thank you and see you soon Sister Margaret and friends. God bless you and keep safe.

#### The Davao course

My warmest greetings to Father Kevin, Sister Margaret, Robyn, Michael, Jackie, Jeff, Mary, Margaret, Ian, ELSPM's tutors, and all old and new students!!!

I am Sister Ut from Vietnam. I belong to the Congregation of Our Lady of the Missions. I have been a student of the school for almost a year and a half. I returned to Vietnam on May 11, 2021, to attend the Davao course to prepare for my lifelong profession in December 2021. Because of the Covid pandemic, my course was held in Vietnam instead of in Davao, Philippines.

My course lasted four months from June 21 to October 23. We were a group of 19

Sisters from different countries: three Indian Sisters, four Bangladeshi Sisters, three Myanmar Sisters, and nine Vietnamese Sisters. Our facilitators are wise, experienced and knowledgeable Sisters. They come from different provinces in my Congregation: Australia, New Zealand, Canada, India, Myanmar, Bangladesh, the Philippines and Vietnam. Since my facilitators come from different time zones, my class times also change frequently.

My curriculum is quite various with many different subjects. These include Sacred stories, Cosmology and Ecology, Liturgy and RNDM Spirituality, Women in Scripture, Consecrated life, Missiology, Encountering Euphrasie - our Foundress, Euphrasie's letters, Dialogue with other faiths, The Rule of St. Augustine, Constitution, and Stewarding Oneness for Missions.

The form of learning is also quite diverse. All learning materials are entirely in English. They are carefully prepared by my Sisters, including PowerPoint, Videos, audio recordings, readings, online websites and drawings. They are mailed to me the day before the course begins. I read and reflect on my own time. Then each day, I had two hours on zoom to discuss in small groups, share in large groups and ask questions to the facilitators. At the end of each day, I wrap up my reflections with prayers, or poems, or songs, or symbols and post them on the group's website.

In addition to formal classes, I take turns to prepare opening prayers before each school day, write monthly newsletters, thank facilitators after each course, and prepare for cultural presentation days.

It can be said that my curriculum is very heavy but it is very quality and extremely necessary for each of the RNDM Sisters. All participants worked very hard: facilitators, mentors, spiritual directors, participants, and technical team. This is a time of grace for each of us. I had a very good opportunity to deepen my understanding of God, the Charismatic and the Spirituality of my Congregation. I have been prepared with the most necessary luggage for a new journey ahead.

I felt that everyone turned to and prayed for me throughout the course. Thanks to the prayers of the Sisters of the Congregation, family, teachers, and friends, my course ended successfully. I have gathered much spiritual fruit from the course. I would like to thank everyone.

In particular, I would like to express my deepest gratitude to my English teachers at ELSPM. I thank you for your love, support, and dedicated teaching for me to have the necessary for my skills during my time at your school. Thanks to that, I was more confident when entering the course, ready to face and overcome the difficulties of a second language. May God the source of love, grace, peace, joy, and blessings be with you always!!!

November will be my retreat time. Please continue to carry me in your prayers.
